CONSERVATION CONFERENCE CENTER BUILDING LOAN REQUEST

The Board of Directors requests the following: Approval to build the new building and approval of a loan not to exceed \$300,000 for the construction of the Conservation Conference Center. The vote is to be taken at the March membership meeting.

The \$300,000 is expected to cover a roughed-in facility including plumbing, electrical and mechanical. Also included are the septic tanks and field, and, the moving of the trap garage.

We estimated it will cost another \$200,000 to finish the project. We have savings from fund raisers in excess of \$80,000 and another \$45,000 in donations. We also have volunteers that have come forward to do portions of the work at no or reduced cost. We believe we will have more donations and with the volunteers we should be able to complete the job. A portion of next years profits, estimated at \$25,000, will also be available.

The loan is to be over twenty years with the payments at a little over \$26,000 per year. Green Stone has verbally agreed to the loan and the approximate payback time and amount. As in the past, the plan is to pay the loan from monies raised through fund raisers and donations, thus not causing a depletion of our operating funds (dues). For the past 10 years our fund raising profits have averaged of a little over \$35,000, for the past five the average has been just short of \$39,000. This is sufficient to allow for the loan payments and meet other capital requirements, with a fairly strong possibility of paying off the loan early, and contains a cushion in the event of some fund raising failures.

We anticipate the operating costs to increase by about \$10,000 per year for insurance, taxes and utilities. This can be covered by eliminating the current rental for our meetings of \$1,800 per year and adding a dinner to the meeting which should bring in an additional \$2,250. We anticipate an increase in meeting attendance due to the dinner and having our own facility which should more than cover the balance. Further, we plan on allowing the members to rent the facility which should generate more revenue. Hopefully, these added revenues will not only cover the added costs but also help keep the dues down.

In addition to having our own facility, after almost 100 years, we will have the ability to diversify our fund raising opportunities and further insure the financial stability of the Club. Further, allowing the use of the building by groups and organizations whose purposes match our own, will enhance our standing in the environmental and resource management fields. The strong position we hold today will be further strengthened. We will also be able to provide services to our local community beyond the use of our ranges. This will benefit us in memberships as well as goodwill. Lastly, the current economic status of the area makes it opportune to get favorable construction costs.

The Board desires your favorable consideration.

CPL CLASSES NEW AND RENEWAL

What's a CPL? That's the proper name for a CCW. (Concealed Pistol License)

The next CPL class for those people who do not already have a CPL license will be a weekend event on January 22, 23, and 24, 2010. You must attend all three days. The times for the classes are 7pm to 10pm on Friday, 8am to 5pm on Saturday and 1pm to 4pm on Sunday. The cost is \$110. Lunch on Saturday is included.

The class will include fundamental gun safety, pistol knowledge and safety, ammunition knowledge, fundamentals of pistol shooting, defensive shooting, firearms and the law, home safety, violent confrontations, and basic handgun skills. The legal ramifications of the CPL law will also be presented. The instructors are NRA certified.

Each participant will need 100 rounds of ammunition and eye and ear protection. There will be an exam at the conclusion of the class. The class will be held on the club grounds.

The class will be limited in size. Advance registration is required.

If you already have a CPL license which is about to expire and need a renewal class, there will be a Renewal Class Saturday, February 20, 2010. The time will be 8am to noon. This class will satisfy the legal requirements for renewal of your Concealed Pistol License. This will include three hours in the classroom and one hour on the range. The cost is \$25.

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Natural Resource Commission Meeting December, 2009

Lots of meetings this month and deer season. My season was better than the last few in that I saw more deer. Success was low because we went to a new area and haven't got it scouted out yet.

The Natural Resources Trust Fund Board gave out grants to the tune of \$37 million covering 67 projects. I don't have the details, but a good share of the money went to local projects. This is one of the areas where our legislatures are trying to grab some money.

The Parks and Recreation Committee reviewed a number of activities including the outreach programs, the 90th anniversary events last June and the fund raising activities planned for this year. The big fund raiser is the \$10 fee on vehicle licenses which will allow those opting in to use the state parks and boat launches without charge. The state parks are moving, slowly, toward more cabins and hard-sided facilities which are becoming more and more popular. Due to the cutback of general funds the state forest camp grounds closed last year will remain closed and facility improvements will remain curtailed.

The Wildlife and Fisheries Committee reviewed the fisheries regulation changes which I will not go into but will suggest you read the guides carefully. There was a discussion on resident nuisance goose problems and the various approaches to correct the problem. At the risk of alienating some local farmers, I suggested that all the relocating be directed to our area. I need to improve my success rate (and the profits of the ammo manufactures).

If you are reading this and haven't put in for your turkey license you better take care of it as you only have two weeks left.

The preliminary firearm deer season results were reviewed. Over-all the harvest was down 10% to 20% with the U.P. at 20% to 30%, northern lower 15% to 25% and the southern lower 5% to 10%. Weather, winter severity and standing corn contributed to the lower numbers. Last winter appears to have been more severe than thought as there were fewer yearlings and the antler development was poor. There was about 1% fewer hunters and licenses purchased.

As expected there was a significant increase in the number of crossbow stamps purchased (over the previous number of permits). The feedback I got had a lot to do with the weight of crossbows and the difficulty handling the weight in the woods. I didn't hear of anyone taking a deer with a crossbow.

The numbers of captive cervid facilities are down to 460 from something near 600 when the CWD problem hit. It is expected that these facilities will continue to drop as the permitting requirements are enforced. Hogs are another problem. There is a map on the DNR web site which shows the areas where wild hogs have been sited. It seems that these are the same areas where hog hunting ranches can be found. I think another crackdown on facilities and permitting is in order.

The public appearance portion of the meeting was uneventful. I don't think the Commissioners are doing enough to entice excitement in this area.

The DNR/DEQ consolidation was reviewed at this meeting. There was little reaction to the presentation. Subsequently I attended another meeting at MUCC headquarters where Mr. Rasher presented his consolidation plan as will, for the most part, be presented to the Governor and, if approved, be put in place on January 17th. I had some experience with consolidations during my GM years, quite a few as a matter of fact. So I am able to critique his approach. Not much to critique as he followed pretty much the pattern of the consolidations I was involved with, a tremendous amount of input from the employ-

ees and the natural resource users with a concern for the employees being able to have a job after all is said and done. All that input had an effect as the Governor issued an addendum to the original order clarifying some issues.

The plan is to divide the state into four regions, assigning a regional director to each. The regional director's jobs will be in the areas of planning and public relations and will report directly to the Director. The regions are based on the watersheds around the state or by Great Lake. The U.P., the west side of the lower, the northeast side of the lower and the southeast side of the lower make up the four regions. I think this will change in time because the U.P. and the west side of the lower are just too large for one person to be effective. The plan includes three deputy directors also reporting to the Director: one over the resource management (fish, wildlife, water); one over stewardship (parks, recreation, forest management); and, one over environmental protection. The division chiefs will report through the deputy directors. The need for these second level managers is obvious when the size of the department is considered. I asked about the law division and was told they hadn't made up their mind on this reporting as yet.

The intent, as I read it, is to have the Natural Resource Commissioners have jurisdiction over the resource management and stewardship portions of the department. That is not where it stands today but, I was assured, that is where it is going. We need to be diligent and make sure that happens. The environmental protection portion is a different beast and should not be under the Commissioners. However, we must also be diligent in assuring this area works closely with the other managers in the planning and decision making processes. Good habitat is critical to all species of fish and wildlife, as well as, ourselves.

The big question, to which Mr. Rasher was very sensitive, was how the monies will be accounted for? In particular how will we be assured the restricted funds are protected? The plan is to establish an independent audit committee whose job it would be to meet that requirement. In addition there would be new reporting requirements added to the process. These would be in addition to the state and federal audits of which a portion is directed at restricted fund spending. Here, again, we need to be diligent to assure our funding is protected.

All in all I was pleased with the proposal. We still need to put forth an effort to get the Director appointment back into the hands of the NRC. And, as I stated, we need to make sure the NRC gets the authority over the resource management and stewardship areas, and, the dollars are spent appropriately.

After Mr. Rasher left the group discussed the information presented. I think there was a general consensus in line with what I described. Caution was probably the key word behind the consensus. There were some comments that the NRC was not following the "sound scientific management" direction approved in proposal "G". I suggested they attend the NRC meetings and express their views so the Commissioners could respond. Oft times I have felt the same way. But most of the time, when I questioned the action, I received additional information which clarified the issue.

Government is run by those who show up. Legislators are elected by those who vote. If you don't show up or don't vote you are going to get what other people give you.

Archer's Arc

I hope everyone had a good Christmas and happy New Year. Maybe you had a good deer season too. I know it has been a tough one. My usual tag filling hunts in the U.P. during the migration has been futile as well. I went every weekend in December with friends and brothers with minimal success. The 2008-09 season must have taken a big toll on the herd. There were numerous tracks mid-December but no where the usual numbers. Locals were blaming wolves, coyotes & the nearby mountain lion that was recently photographed and finally verified by the DNR to exist. I think mother-mature did more than all combined.

I need to tell a little story. January 4th starts another indoor archery season. And, preparing for this upcoming season has been a little stressful. Some long time volunteers have either moved away or decided to not help operate leagues this year. I appreciate all their dedication over the years to provide many people a chance to get out and enjoy the sport of archery. There was some schedule conflicts and some tempers flared but all has been worked out. The adult participants in archery has been slowly shrinking over the past few years while the youth leagues seem to be growing. I hope this is a good thing for the future of archery.
